COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Acting is an exploratory course that is designed to help the students create their own acting processes. Through performances, character studies, and activities, the students will engage in an active journey from the first day to discover the how to create and sustain theatrical truth both in themselves and onstage.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Upon successful completion of this course, the student should be able to:

- Apply methods articulated by Konstantin Stanislavski and his contemporaries to text and character creation
- Analyze the text of a play in terms of its structure, form, style and historical background
- Play strong objectives as well as maintain active subtext when acting
- Create and sustain an active inner life of a character based upon the actor's imagination and the playwright's given circumstances
- Relate and utilize specific exercise work to help solve challenges faced within assigned scene work
- Speak with proper diaphragmatic breathing and correct vowel, diphthong and consonant pronunciation

WORK ENVIRONMENT:

Students are expected to attend and eagerly participate in all regularly scheduled classes and examinations. Students who are not prepared to present their work when called on in class or who have unexcused absences on presentation days will receive a zero for that particular lesson/activity. Due to the presentation and activity-based structure to the course, scheduled presentations cannot be made up. You will be expected to be responsible, respectful, and resourceful!

You will be graded on your responsible, disciplined commitment to daily work. **Students are expected to keep up with the daily syllabus**. This is a highly subjective subject, so the instructor will be as specific as possible in critique and grading matters. As this is a craft that is improved throughout a lifetime, it is improvement that I will be focusing my attention upon. REMEMBER: it is attitude and not aptitude that will defines your altitude.

MAJOR ASSIGNMENTS:

Participation & class assignments - In this class, **silence is not golden!** This class is based solely upon student participation. In the spirit of this, participation will weigh heavily on the student's grade; this grade will also fluctuate over the course of the semester.



Autodrama- Like an autobiography, this will be a performance in which the student will find a metaphor for their life and create a three minute performance piece that elaborates upon that metaphor employing whatever theatrical/media their little heart desires.

Scenework – This assignment will consist of the students presenting scene work with a partner.

Monologues – The students will work on solo performance pieces.

Review- Each student will be required to see the production at Saint Patrick High School this semester. The review will be based in the three questions: What is the artist doing? How well did they do it? Was it worth doing?

Final Assignment- The final for this course is the performance of a monologue and scene written by the students and performed possibly for an audience.

Exam- A midterm exam will be a take home assignment. The due date is indicated on the class schedule. NO MAKEUP EXAMS will be given except under extenuating circumstances. The final assignment will serve as the final exam grade.

Quizzes- Quizzes will generally consist of between 5-10 multiple-choice, true/false, and/or essay questions. They may be announced a class period ahead or of the "pop" variety. The questions for quizzes may be on material assigned for reading but not yet discussed in lectures.

Additional Theatre Review- You can receive up to 20 points for attending and reviewing a an additional theatrical production. Details will be given by the instructor.

Ushering for a Saint Patrick Performing Arts Centre Event- You can receive **10 points** for each evening you usher for an event in the Saint Patrick Performing Arts Centre. This entails handing out programs, helping people to their seats, and a few other safety related issues that will be explained to you.
