(318) FINE ARTS (THEATRE) SYLLABUS

Course Description

The Theatre portion of the Fine Arts course is designed to teach the student the fundamentals of storytelling, the basic craft of acting, and the structure and skillsets of the theatrical designer. Throughout the course of this portion of the class, the students will create the collaborative theatrical performance element of their portfolio.

Required Course Materials

- Pencils/ Pens
- Sketchbook- to be purchased through the school for \$7.00

Learner Outcomes and Assessments

At the end of these six weeks, a student should be able to...

- Collaborate to produce a short performance piece.
 - ASSESSMENT: Storytelling Assignment
- Employ basic theories of acting and directing to perform a scene and monologue.
 ASSESSMENT: Improvisational scene, Monologue
- Employ technical and design practices to create costume and set designs.
 ASSESSMENT: Set Design and Costume draftings
- Recognize the structural elements of a play and employ them in writing a short play. **ASSESSMENT: Writing a short play**
- Develop criteria for intelligent and constructive criticism of a play.
 ASSESSMENT: Written play critiques

Work Environment (In-Person/ Remote)

For each class a student needs to...

- Be punctual and attend every class, except in sickness and emergencies.
- Have the appropriate supplies required each day.
- Have read the assigned material and be prepared to discuss any readings.
- Listen attentively and participate through class discussions and group lessons.
- Respect everyone's point of views and ideas.
- Choose to learn as much as possible and show a positive attitude about the material.
- Develop positive learning habits throughout the class
- Ensure that when you view another student's work, you will do so with an open mind.
